

TEACHINGS FROM THE REVEREND

Happy Mother's Day

While growing up, we had tremendous and excellent opportunities to meet several people and learn many important things about our lives. So, even if I say, "Those people are one of the biggest influences in our lives," I think this statement is not an overstatement. Some of you have great memories with them, and you still contact those wonderful people to maintain a good friendship. Why? Because you appreciate their guidance, kindness, and sincere heart, which you received from them.

One of the Jodo Shin Buddhism terms is calling these people "Zen-Jishiki." This term means "A good friend or teacher who leads one to the Buddhist way, being humble and compassionate." And I think many of you have been strongly influenced by people around you. I firmly believe that person is Mother.

We all have or had a mother, and most of you received your mother's wonderful blessings, love, wisdom, and compassionate heart. So, Mother's memories are always precious to many of us and remain in our hearts as her unique gifts or our beautiful treasures.

I came to Hawaii as a Hongwanji minister on December 1, 1985. The day before I left Japan, my family gathered at one of the restaurants for my farewell dinner. On the next day, we all went to Haneda airport. While talking with my wife at Haneda airport, my sister told me I should go to the gate because they announced that my flight's boarding would start soon. So, before I went to the TSA checkpoint, I hugged my mother and told her, "I am going and will do my best." Then she gave me an envelope and told me to read it whenever possible. In those days, the TSA checkpoint was much easier than today and didn't take much time to go through. When I completed the TSA checkpoint, I headed to the gate. On the way to the gate, I could see the people who were seeing me off at the airport because there was a huge window where we could see each other and say goodbye to the people. I waved my hand to them. Then, I saw that my mother was saying something. I couldn't hear what she said, but I could read her lips, and she said to me as follows, "Genkide-ne. Well, take care of your health." When I saw her eyes, they were full of tears. So, I felt so sad for leaving her. So, I bowed to her and continued to walk to the gate. I truly felt her kindness and compassion.

Our mother temple in Japan provided me with a business class ticket; it was a very comfortable ride on the airplane. As you may know, Japan Airlines offers high-quality services, so I enjoyed my trip to Hawaii with a business-class seat. The cabin attendants were so polite, and their services were excellent. After I left Haneda airport, they asked me for drinks, so I ordered one of the famous scotch whiskeys. Wow, it was so smooth and tasty. So, I enjoyed their excellent services. While drinking scotch whiskey, I remembered the envelope my mother gave me at the airport. I know she gave me money, but it was not only the money, but also a few pages of a letter were together with it. When I started reading it, tears flowed out of my eyes. I sincerely appreciated her unconditional love and compassion through her message.

The mother is a great person to the children, an excellent teacher and friend, and always cares for and embraces her children unconditionally, regardless of who they are. Mother's love is much higher than any mountain and much deeper than any ocean.

I want to share a warm feeling about the story with you. John is 65 years old and lives with his mother. When he was 35 years old, his father passed away. John is the only child there, so he has felt a strong responsibility to take care of his mother since then. His mother did all the housework. Twenty-five years later, his mother started forgetting many things. She failed to lock the door, buying the same items repeatedly. It was a typical symptom of the early part of Alzheimer's disease. When she fell on the lanai, she broke her hip bone, and after that incident, she couldn't move much, so she was bedridden most of the time and needed more intensive care. Whenever they went outside, John put her into the wheelchair. She loved to go to the park and walk the riverbank path. So, from time to time, she enjoyed receiving fresh air, seeing the beautiful blooming flowers, and hearing the birds singing.

When she was 95, her Alzheimer's disease became more severe. One morning, when she woke up, she told her son: "Who are you?" "Where am I?" John replied to her kindly and said, "I am your son, and this is your

home." He kindly and patiently explained, but she couldn't remember anything about him. However, her appetite was so good that he fixed her meals three times daily, and she enjoyed eating her son's food.

On May 5, it was boys' day. John took his mother to the riverbank. There were hundreds of flying carp displayed in the sky. Mother was so happy to see many of Koinobori, the flying carps in the sky, and she put her hands together in Gassho and said to him, "Arigato John, Thank you, John." She was able to recall her son. John was so happy and said to her, "Arigato, Okaasan. Thank you, Mom." Mother had never forgotten her son.

Even if your mother passed away some time ago, her beautiful memories and guidance are cherishing you and will never fade from your heart. Those memories are always guiding you on the path of truth.

Shinran Shonin sincerely appreciated the passage by his master Tao-Cho of China, who said, "Those who have been born first guide those who come later, and those who are born later follow the path of those who were born before." Maybe your mother had passed away, but she joined the Buddhahood and became a Buddha, still guiding everyone on the path of truth with her great wisdom and compassion.

Growing up, you came to the temple with your parents. Mother and Father held your hands and walked the path to the temple. Young parents, "Now, it's your turn to hold your children's hands and guide them on the path to the temple." Temple is where we can learn and rejoice in the joy and happiness of others.

Mother's Day is truly for all of us to express our sincere gratitude and appreciation to our mothers for their outstanding and selfless dedication, regardless of whether they are with us or not.

Slurp & Savor: Elevating Chopstick Proficiency with Somen Nagashi Eri Nomura

On March 27, the Gakuen students got to experience a tasty Japanese tradition "Somen Nagashi" while exercising their hashi (chopstick) use mastery.

Somen is a thin Japanese wheat noodle popularly enjoyed during hot summers. The noodles are boiled briefly, then chilled in icy cold water. Cooked somen is then served with mentsuyu (a dipping sauce made from soy sauce, mirin, and dashi). It's known for its delicate texture, light taste, and is commonly garnished with toppings like negi (green onions) and nori (seaweed). It's popular for a refreshing, low-calorie meal during Japan's heat.

One of the most fun and interactive ways to enjoy somen is somen nagashi (nagashi meaning "flow" in Japanese). A long tube is positioned at an angle from high to low to create a "waterslide" where the noodles make their way down a stream of flowing water. Students used their agile hashi skills to "catch" those slippery noodles as they slide past in the flowing cold water. Students had to act quick, or they would miss the next bite! Chaos and laughter erupted as students plunged their hashi into the stream, hoping to capture their meal.

Somen nagashi is a unique culinary experience that both adults and children love to enjoy. Because of the challenging nature jostling with others, somen nagashi is seen as a fun group activity and even a school festival activity, making a perfect occasion for our Gakuen students as well!

With just a month and a half left of the school year, the students at Gakuen have been soaking up a ton of knowledge this year. This communal experience was not just about slurping somen, but also about having fun and building connections, allowing students to unwind. As they gear up to wrap up another school year, moments like these will stick with them as some of the coolest memories of their time at Gakuen.

The Malama Dolphins showed up strong. Cara and Ava demonstrated how to make spicy tuna rolls while Karisa and Janie demonstrated how to make homemade pop tarts. The girls researched and learned a lot about the different ingredients we used for each of our recipes. They worked together to create their own slideshow to accompany the live demonstration.

The day's event ended with all 4Hers making doggy toys using cotton shirts to be donated to the Human Society. The day's events ended with the judges awarding ribbons and giving feedback for all presenters. The best part about Teach-in, everyone agrees, was taste testing all of the 'ono food samples!

Other happenings:

Lōkahi Girls: The Lōkahi Girls had a hands-on experience at Chang Farms this past month. Chang Farms was started in 2020 by Natasha and Deashia Chang. The land was originally purchased in the 1800's by Natasha's great grandparents Ying 'A'ana Chang and Hattie Kukahiko. The unassuming farm is in a prime resort area in Mākena. Despite everything around being developed, the farm retains its humble charm and local feel. The girls and parents enjoyed an invigorating tour of the farm and property which spans an impressive 6 acres. They were fortunate to have the opportunity to make kalo poke and pound pa'i'ai from locally grown kalo. Chang Farms using regenerative farming techniques by utilizing mulch to keep the lands cool and worm stations throughout their farm as natural fertilization for their soil. The girls are grateful for the experience that helped expand their knowledge on their chosen project of Food, Health, and Nutrition.

Malama Dolphins: In March, the Dolphins camped for 2 nights at the Waihe'e Refuge and enjoyed making s'mores and popcorn over the campfire. During the daytime, they hiked to the Waihe'e Stream and swam and at night went sand crab hunting and hung out in our tents.



Buddha Reads: The Wager by David Grann

Gathering virtually on April 7th, the Buddha Reads Book Club delved into the captivating pages of "The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny, and Murder" penned by David Grann. Marking our 30th literary voyage, the discussion was enriched by the diverse perspectives of our members: Bob, Linda, Danny, Joan, and Gary.

At the heart of "The Wager" lies the gripping saga of the alleged mutiny aboard His Majesty's Ship, lost amidst the tumultuous seas off Patagonia's coast in 1740. Marooned for months, the crew's harrowing journey of survival, spanning over 3,000 stormladen miles, unfurls a narrative of resilience and human drama. Yet, six months later, the arrival of another battered craft bearing three castaways introduces a contrasting tale, stirring the depths of intrigue.

Reflecting on Grann's narrative prowess, our members found themselves immersed in a realm where fact seamlessly intertwines with fiction. 'The Wager" resonated with thematic echoes of past literary explorations. The indomitable human spirit, epitomized by tales such as "The Indifferent Stars Above: The Harrowing Saga of a Donner Party Bride," paralleled the crew's struggle for survival. However, amidst adversity, Grann's narrative also lays bare the darker undercurrents of colonialism and prejudice. Instances of maltreatment towards indigenous peoples and lingering attitudes of superiority illuminate stark parallels with past readings, underscoring perennial themes of injustice and cultural clash.

Concluding our discussion, the consensus was unanimous: "The Wager" merits a fervent recommendation. As we eagerly anticipate our next literary odyssey, navigating the pages of "The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store" by James McBride, we stand poised to embark on yet another enriching journey of exploration and enlightenment.

In the coming days, a new ballot will be circulated, ushering in the democratic process as we select our next trio of literary treasures. Join us as we continue to traverse the boundless realms of literature, guided by the timeless wisdom of the Buddha.

BODHI PROJECTS

Planning for New Multi-Purpose Building Underway

Over the past two (2) years, Wailuku Hongwanji Mission has undertaken a planning process to determine how best to manage the upgrading of our campus facilities. The focus of this effort has been to answer the question, "what should we do with the Old Language School/Judo Dojo building?" We began this journey with a strategic planning session facilitated by Ms. Cindy Alm in June 2022. Representatives from WHM's Board of Directors and affiliate organizations explored ways to create a safe and functional campus that would contribute to the growth of Wailuku Hongwanji as a Community Temple.

Following the session, the Board decided that replacing the Old Language School and Judo Dojo with a new Multi-Purpose Building would be the optimal solution. A new facility would address the requirements of WHM's martial arts programs, religious education initiatives, and affiliate organization activities, all while extending a warm welcome to our wider island community.

To gather diverse perspectives, we engaged The Shain Group to conduct stakeholder interviews, encompassing both

members and non-members of WHM. The results reinforced the foundation of support for initiating a capital campaign to fund the construction of the new Multi-Purpose Building. Detailed planning for the capital campaign will begin later this year.

Building upon these efforts, GYA Architects was enlisted to develop conceptual plans for the new facility. They have prepared a preliminary Site Plan and Floor Plan for review and consideration. These are only early concepts and much more work will be needed to advance the design of the building, including definition of interior space needs (storage, indoor plumbing, electrical, etc.), as well as building elevations and related architectural details. These details will be developed after we receive input from our affiliates and our Sangha.

Key criteria guiding the development of the Site Plan and Floor Plan include:


A single-story building of approximately 2,880 square feet designed for versatility in accommodating various uses, such as martial arts training, religious programs, affiliate organization gatherings, and

community events.

- Flexibility facilitated by partition doors, allowing for separate spaces when needed, such as during non-training times (will require repositioning/storage of Judo mats).
- Consideration of building placement to comply with parking regulations, vehicular access, and building setback requirements.

As noted above, while there is more detailed planning ahead, including architectural design and lengthy County permitting requirements, input from our Sangha would also be appreciated. With this in mind, may we ask that members provide comments or question you may have regarding the proposal. Comments or questions you may have may be sent to the Temple office at whm@wailukuhongwanji.org. May we ask that your thoughts be provided to us no later than May 15, 2024.

Your time and support are invaluable as we strive to ensure the long-term sustainability of the Dharma and supporting Temple and community programs at Wailuku Hongwanji.

Gotan-e means "coming down birthday gathering." Another name for this occasion is Fujimatsuri (wisteria festival). The double-wisteria crest is the temple crest of Wailuku Hongwanji Mission. The pendant of wisteria blossoms suggests humility and sincere reverence to Amida.
